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Murder Mystery

On January 23-26, the Ogemaw Heights Theatrical Troupe put on their annual murder mystery dinner theatre, *I'm Getting Murdered in the Morning*, at Sandbaggers. The plot centers around Brenda Montague and Eddie Crock's wedding reception, where in-laws have been fighting and even the bride and groom are running late.



Just as the families think the chaos is over, Harold, Brenda's father, and Sheila, Eddie's mother, receive quite the surprise, as an old "friend" from their past shows up at the reception. Moments later, this "friend" is murdered on the dance floor, and now it's up to Detective Parker and the wedding party to solve the mystery.

Senior, Ivy Ingleson played newspaper columnist, Mary Berger, and has been a part of the murder mystery productions since her sophomore year. She said that she has been reflecting a lot on her experience in the productions. "Doing this for the last time has made me very bittersweet," Ivy explained. "It has made me realize how much I'm going to miss it when I graduate." Describing challenges she faced, Ivy said that, "Doing improvisation has always been a challenge, not just on my end, but for many other actors as well." She added, "You never know what audience members are going to say to you while you're in character, so you have to be prepared for anything."

On the other hand, for senior Sam Baird, this was her first time doing one of the murder mystery productions. In this show, she played the role of Bunny Kelly, the Maid of Honor. She said that being in her first murder mystery production has been vastly different from what she has been used to. "One of the weirdest things about the murder mysteries, for me, has been performing at a restaurant instead of an auditorium," Sam explained. "The atmosphere and setting were definitely something we all had to get used to when we started practicing at Sandbaggers." Sam also commented on how different this show was from the spring and fall shows. "There was a lot more audience interaction."

It was also sophomore Caity Ahearne's first time being in one of the murder mysteries. Caity said that being in her first murder mystery has been an interesting experience. "I like that I get to learn how to do improv from watching all of the other actors who have more stage time than me, and who have done murder mysteries before," she explained, "It makes me really excited for what next year is going to bring."

Audience members were treated with a lovely dinner, along with "wedding cake" for dessert. A silent auction was held at the four performances with many gift baskets being offered, and the grand prize being a different Coach purse every night. The show sold out at all four performances. The money raised from the performances and the auction prizes will be used toward future theatrical productions.

Two seniors of the Ogemaw Heights Class of 2020 have made the decision to continue their education in college by showing their athleticism and staying committed to their school work until graduation. Jere Getzinger Jr. and Tyler Eedy have made the step from a small town school to NCAA Division 1.

Jere started to play football in 4th Grade as part of the Ogemaw Browns. In high school, he made the varsity team his sophomore. After a 8-3 year in 2019 and giving Ogemaw a playoff berth in the MHSAA Division 5 Playoffs. Getzinger signed with other prospects on National Early Signing Day Dec.18 2019. Jere signed and will be continuing his education and football career at Eastern Michigan University to play for the Eagles at the NCAA D1 FBS Mid American Conference (MAC).

- Transfer mixture to a piping bag and pipe into strawberries.
- Garnish with crushed graham crackers and serve

- 1 c. cream cheese, softened
- 1/2 c. heavy cream
- 1/4 c. powdered sugar
- 1 pt. strawberries, bottoms and tops sliced off and hollowed out
- Crushed graham crackers, for garnish



To access these scholarships go to the school website and find the E.S.P. - Educational Support Partnership section to access these scholarships. All scholarships should be due back by March to your counselor.


